Medford: Hatred in our backyard

ast month I was appalled to have received pictures that depicted more LGBT hatred in the form of "God's words and commands" by the New England Baptist Church, Salem St., in Medford, Ma. I wrote to the Medford Human Rights Commission's office, not merely as TRT and NightTimez's publisher, but as a concerned citizen of the commonwealth of Massachusetts. Knowing that people who live just five minutes from Boston experienced such levels of hatred from a religious organization's signboard message reminded me of the KKK signs that I often saw in Cullman, AL. But, it does not only happen in AL. Ignorance is found anywhere-even in New England.

What I will never understand is how people call us sinners for living our lives as God has created and made us. I never expect people to fully understand, but I do not tolerate hatred either. Such are the constant covert and cowardly attacks on the lives of our community members. These messages carry more than just "religious" reformation as a meaning. They are enveloped by alleged

messages and judgment from a God that teaches nothing like that. Yet, this is done in "the name of God." But, who gives another human being (sinners at that, for we all sin at one time or another) the right to demean our lives, the lives of our loved ones, or to judge me for the natural act of loving someone of the same sex? Is there not some type of hypocrisy behind such messages?

A photo of the church's hate-filled signboard posted in Medford Square was posted on TRT's website immediately on Sept. 15, 2009. My email to the HRC's Office called for immediate action from their part. The church's message of loathing inflicted vet another "straight" blow to our LGBTQI community. Such expressions have been and are often misconstrued by others who are ignorant to our struggles. Others have taken similar messages against other groups, as our history has depicted, as a green light to mistake its already twisted meaning. And, others, like Eric Patten, have. Massachusetts Attorney General Martha Coakley has taken it as extreme as Patten's acts were, according

Ukrainian government has their way. Could this be the end of the Yellow Brick Road for his Daddy plans?

Sometimes people want to bypass their grief and quickly move on to another lover. In the short run this may help this person not to feel the pain of the loss. Usually this process also bypasses the process of coming to terms with what went wrong

The truth is, if you give yourself time to feel it all even though it might hurt, it will allow you to truly move on, free from leftover issues of this recent relationship.

GLBTQ Online High School: The future e-classroom

"Until every public and private high school in the United States ensures that every gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender young adult can receive a good education in an environment that is safe for them physically and emotionally, and the diversity they represent, there will be a critical need for an alternative for these young people to get an education" said Brian McNaught, a Massachusetts resident who serves in the GLBTQ Online High School Board of Advisors.

A new alternative for the GLBTQ community, the GLBTQ Online High School's mission is to "provide a safe and welcoming educational community that provides a high quality, comprehensive college-preparatory online high school experience for students who are GLBTQ (gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender or questioning their sexual orientation or gender) using the best technology and techniques of distance education."

According to the GLBTQ Online High School's Executive Director, David Glick, the idea for the GLBTQ Online High School was first launched in November, 2008.

"It came out of my experience in virtual

schools and my passion for populations that have been neglected and disenfranchised by our current educational system," said Glick, who not only possesses online experience, but has been in K-12 education for over 25 years and has worked extensively with public, private, and charter schools in a variety of roles, including teacher, curriculum coordinator, "In addition to eliminating the negatives of possible harassment and abuse that is all too common in our schools, we will also provide support services and opportunities for positive socializing, in addition to our instructional program."

The GLBTQ Online High School is not your typical online program often associated with higher education programs. These are courses that would leave online computer university programs in awe. Produced by FYI Online, a creator of next-generation courses, the online experience is enhanced to the maximum. FYI's Teacher SpaceTM program is "one-of-a-kind" tailoring the curriculum, which is especially created for teachers. Its platform allows teachers to personalize their courses creatively and use a series of media

tools that appeal to a broad spectrum of students. The platform includes video, glossary, chart creation, blogging, multimedia, wiki and notes tools, sample document templates, and more. Such a platform promotes a richer experience, both for the teacher and the student alike. To view a sample online classroom, visit:

The HS will work with the needs of each student in either a part-time or full-time setting, according to its website's content. Furthermore, the school offers a full high school diploma - not a GED. The school offers a guarantee that its credits and diploma will be accepted by colleges and universities. With on-going enrollment, students can advance at their own pace, based on the individualized learning plan developed with the GLBTQ Online High School advisor and the

"Once we open in January, [2010] we will operate on a rolling-enrollment basis," said Glick, whom for six years has been an independent consultant specializing in helping schools develop K-12 online learning programs for students and teachers. "Students

student's parent or guardian, if applicable,

will be able to start classes any day of the year and complete them at their own pace. We will operate all-year round."

This ideal and virtual environment seems to be ideal for today's GLBTQ students. However, a recent poll conducted by TRT revealed that 78 percent of respondents oppose the idea of such an online high school. Alex Morse, Brown University student and founder of the first Gay Straight Alliance (GSA) in Holyoke High School concurs with the poll results.

"While I think it is important to create safe spaces for GLBTQ youth/students, I think we must focus on making mainstream schools safe for all students," said Morse, who works as a Youth Career Counselor for Career Point, and is the President of the Holyoke GLBTQ Task Force. "GLBTQ youth should not have to enroll in an online high school to prevent bullying, discrimination, and harassment. All students deserve the 'high school experience' and GLBT students should not accept anything less. We deserve to attend schools with our straight counterparts and feel safe and empowered doing so. Therefore, this high

to reports from the Cape Cod Times, Sept. 24. Coakley's office filed a "civil rights" injunction against gay basher Eric Patten. The order forbids Patten from violating the civil rights of the two lesbians he beat up this summer in Provincetown and it further prohibits him to act in such or similar manner towards other people in Massachusetts based on actual or perceived sexual orientation. Are people who are thought to have an actual or perceived sexual orientation what the New England Baptist Church is after? Some





may agree, although based on their new sign, I believe that may not be the case. The pressure the church received in the form of emails and approaches by the city of Medford's HRC Office appears to have hit a nerve. The church's reply almost points to the "we are the victims" type of behavior. The second sign reads: "Your problem is with God and the Bible, NOT this church!" But, the problem was always theirs. What non-sense this is? They would not have received such heat from others, had they not started such defamatory rhetoric.

When TRT approached the Medford

HRC's Director, Diane McLeod, she was clear about the town's welcoming atmosphere.

"The Medford Human Rights Commission along with city officials, individuals, and organizations in the community do not condone public statements that demean or condemn any one or any group of individuals in our community. We strive to welcome all persons to Medford and hope to promote understanding and tolerance to create a positive community spirit. Those who choose to publicly condemn others will have their voices drowned out by the masses who work for tolerance and understanding," said McLeod.

And, although McLeod is right, the hate message was also protected by the right of speech in our own Constitution. Even so, I applaud McLeod's firm stance on the situation (printed on TRT's website, click at the end of this story to be redirected to it). It is about acceptance and understanding, not really about tolerance. For instance, the words "I have no tolerance for hatred" is not the same as asking others to "tolerate" our lives or have tolerance for them. I do not seek tolerance. I seek understanding, tru Christian love, equality, fairness, etc. If churches are looking for sinners, they have plenty of fish in the sea to grab on to from all walks of life. But, they are not targeting all of the sinners at this church. And, that is why




we must remain vigilant. We must stay alert and protect ourselves, especially in the places where we feel free to be ourselves. Life as a member of the LGBT community is anything but a utopia, even in New England, especially in New England!

No, I don't think it's because he's too old or too single; I think it's about being too gay.



I'm genuinely confused with the trans community vocabulary. Could you explain the differences between transgender, transsexual, gender queer, gender fluid, cisgender and cross dresser?

-Confused Gay Man, Jamaica Plains, MA Hi Confused Gav Man.

You catch me in a deliriously good mood my Gay friend!! As I write this, I've got some fine Zydeco music playing in the background. I've been crowned Miss Trans Northampton, I finally overcame the creepingly pervasive anti-trans discrimination to get not just a job, but a Good Job! AND I scored a fabulous apartment with an amazing view in Downtown Holvoke!!!!

Life is good! But, the struggle for LGBT Equality never stops, must never cease! So I've fired up "Sylvia" my aging but trusty old PowerBook and I'm ready to answer your question! It's a really good one this month too! Certainly a big enough one to warrant an entire column of its own!

Don't get me wrong, it's a tough question. Real tough. And, I'm probably going to get myself in some very serious trouble, but here goes...

"Trans community vocabulary."

You could not have asked about a more divisive and hotly contested topic as this one my rightfully confused Gay friend. I myself have participated in some knock-down, drag-out discussions about the meanings and proper usage of these terms. There is often very little agreement even inside the community about the language we use. I personally think it is one of the things that divide us most deeply as a community.

But I'm the petty dictator with a newspaper column so I'm going to give it to you straight (-ish, esque??) to the best of my own ability and understanding. My advance apologies to those I may offend, but if you were the kind of folks who wanted the clean and sanitized Webster's definitions you wouldn't be reading this column!!

Now strap yourselves in 'cause here we go!!!

"Transgender" is the most all encompassing of the words listed here. Broadly it is often used to refer to the entire spectrum of the Trans community. Kind of a useful catch-all, which I believe is helpful in uniting us, wherever on the spectrum we may lie, as Brothers and Sisters. Although to be fair, I have spoken with folks at either extreme, Transsexuals and Cross Dressers both, who most definitely felt that the term did not apply to them.

Simply it can be defined as a person who has transitioned from one gender to another.

Specifically it is also often applied to Trans people who have transitioned using a method other than GRS (Gender Reassignment Surgery), such as hormones, plastic surgery, simple presentation or any other old thing up to but not necessarily excluding GRS (formerly referred to as SRS or Sexual Reassignment Surgery, in case you were

Cisgender is a way of referring to non-trans folks without needing to use negative terminology, like "non-trans" or judgmental terminology like "normal" or "natural" which tend to degrade transpeople and paint us as the "other." It's a fairly new term, which comes originally from the terminology of the scientific world. "Cis" meaning, "on this

It's worth mentioning here though that many cisgender folks I have encountered strongly resent being labeled as such. They dislike the idea that others might presume to define them, to put labels on them without their consent or input

I'll just let that one sit with you and digest a lit-

A Transsexual is a person who has transitioned or feels the need to transition, by means of GRS in addition to all of the other means I listed in relation to Transgender folks. Basically, your more traditional "Christine Jorgensen Model" transper-

This is the category that mainstream society is probably most familiar with, due to the plethora of Discovery Channel Documentaries and Lifetime Original Movies on the subject that has been surfacing in the last few years.

This one falls apart a little too though, because some folks who fit the Transgender model I listed, who may or may not go for full GRS also consider themselves to be Transsexual. Myself included.

At the other end of the spectrum we have Cross-Dressers. I'm not going to be a fool and say this one is simple, I'd get crucified I'm sure, but put simply these are folks who identify as one gender and like or prefer to present as another. Whether as a fetish, a lifestyle or just because they think Glittering Ballgowns/Stylish Tuxedos are more fabulous than their everyday togs!!

Cross Dressers tend to get looked down upon by the rest of the community because we often have difficulty understanding them. I find this terribly unfortunate as I have known some cross dressers who are absolutely fantastic, well-balanced folks that I am proud to include as an integral part of our community. Plus, if we lose them, we lose Eddie Izzard!! Who I happen to think is one of the smartest comedians I've seen and completely bril-

Although I ID as Transsexual/Transgender, I thought that maybe I was a Cross-Dresser myself for many years. It took a lot of self-reflection and the discovery that I was actually just an exceptionally glamorous and somewhat kinky woman who's never been very good at "the casual look" to figure out that I wasn't. At least not entirely. I have been flirting with some Drag King Performance ideas,

Feeling even more confused vet? Yes, No? No worries my friends, stay with me, I've got a steady hand on the tiller.

Now they are twentysomethings and almost twentysomethings, who read Kate Bornstein's "Gender Outlaw" as their introduction to all things Trans!! And they could give a flying fig about what you think Gender is! They'll be what they darn well feel like, when they feel like it, whether the rest of us like it or not! They might be a boy in the morning, a girl at night or neither or even other!! Often all of the above!

Frankly, and I'm sure you can tell, I find them wildly exciting!!

And as for their sexuality?!?! If you refuse to conform to the gender binary, what do terms like Homo, Hetero, or even Bi-Sexual even mean!?!? They're hardly applicable anymore. Everything is up in the air! Ready for re-definition!!!

So please, keep your questions coming!! I know you might still be afraid to ask, you might think your questions are offensive or just plain dumb. And, maybe they are. But I know you've got them and you have my word that all askers will remain anonymous because I love you.

Although I wouldn't turn down a drink at the bar as thanks if you happen to bump into me out in the world!!! Slainte!!!

Boston Living Center celebrates life and community service at upcoming annual Thanksgiving event

Celebrating life and friends is what the Boston Living Center (BLC)-New England's largest community center for those living with HIV and AIDS-is all about. And it's also the theme of the organization's annual Celebration of Life Thanksgiving event to be held on Tuesday, November 24 at 5:30 p.m. at the Hynes Convention Center in Boston.

The event, which corresponds with the BLC's 20th anniversary, includes a traditional Thanksgiving dinner as well as live entertainment and a look back at 20 years of community service. Boston's Mayor Thomas Menino will speak during the dinner, and Liz Walker, former TV news anchor, will host the event.

Last year, Celebration of Life drew approximately 600 people. This year, it's likely to draw as many as 1,000, says Marc Davino, director of development.

"We would love to have people come from far and wide," he says, adding that anyone living with HIV or AIDS-as well as well as their loved ones-can attend. Guests must RSVP no later than November 16 to ensure a spot.

And tickets will be going quickly, says Scott Galinsky, BLC member. "People wait for the

event all year long. They talk about it for weeks afterwards. It's really an event not to be missed."

The Celebration of Life event reflects the BLC's longtime history of serving meals to those with HIV and AIDS. Today, the meals

program-a collaborative effort with the Red Cross-serves approximately 40,000 meals annually and continues to be the organization's cornerstone effort, says Davino.

Like all services at the BLC, the Celebration of Life event is free. "It's the largest fundraiser we put on, although it's very unique because we don't charge a ticket and there's no auction," says Davino.

The Hynes Convention Center donates the space for the event, and approximately 300 volunteers donate their time. Nearly half of the volunteers serve food directly to the guests. Each server participates in the TIPS program, which stands for 'Thanksgiving is People Serving.' The program requires each server to raise at least \$200. Last year, the TIPS program generated \$14,000. The BLC hopes it will bring in \$20,000 this year, says Davino.

All of the food is donated as well, says Michael Bacon, director of nutritional services. The BLC typically reaches out to local restaurants, hotels, and catering companies to solicit food donations-and the response is usually overwhelming, he says.

In particular, the Adams Chapman Company

History of New England Transgender Pride

Now that we have organized the second annual New England Trans United Pride March and Rally on October 3, 2009, and as we look forward to many more trans rights marches to come, it seems a good time to record how and why this important event began.

A Transgender Pride Movement started in the New England region as a response to two developments in the late 1990s and early 2000s: (1) the annual Transgender Day of Remembrance and (2) the exclusion of protections for gender identity/expression from the federal Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) proposed by Massachusetts Congressman Barney Frank.

Trans woman Rita Hester had been brutally murdered in Boston on November 28, 1998, sadly just one of many trans people killed every year. Publicity surrounding Hester's unsolved murder led to a candlelight vigil for her in San Francisco in 1999. Since then, memorials to remember those killed due to anti-transgender hatred or prejudice (transphobia) are held annually in hundreds of cities around the world. November 20, 2009 will mark the 11th International Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDOR).

I attended TDORs in Boston, Northampton, Amherst, and Springfield, MA every year since 2000. I experienced the vigil as a solemn wake with all the emotions of loss and mourning of a mass funeral. Names of the year's murdered were read while gruesome stories of violent killings - stabbings, rapes, shootings, beatings, and mutilations beyond recognition - were recounted. I was often asked to speak at our local TDORs and I did, choking back tears every time. These were people just like me - and the world was losing more of us senselessly every year.

While recognizing the importance of honoring our dead and educating the public about the horrible problem of hate crimes against trans people, I also wondered why TDOR was the only time my international trans community gathered together as one. Where were the occasions to honor our living, to award the accomplishments of our transgender organizations and leaders, to celebrate our everyday lives? How were we supposed to move out of the darkness of a tunnel of intense oppres-

On November 20, 2005, at the TDOR held at the Media Education Foundation in Northampton, MA, I again rose to speak. This time. I not only expressed my sorrow at the recitation of the long list of the names of our dead, but also my frustration and anger. I put out a challenge to the trans community to move beyond victim-hood. We could march forward instead to victory through a new Transgender Pride Movement, I said. I challenged those gathered there to work with me to create a Transgender Pride March in

Northampton, Pride had helped other minority communities make legislative, social, and progress—Blacks. economic Latinos Lesbians, Gay, and Bisexuals. It could help us trans people too if only we would organize.

I waited and watered the seed of this vision at subsequent TDORs, where I continued to speak out. I wrote and read a poem, "TDOR," about the need for Trans Pride.

By fall of 2007, it became clear that the Human Rights Campaign and Congressman Barney Frank had worked together to remove transgender citizens from the proposed federal Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA). Frank argued that there was not enough votes in the House to pass the bill if it included gender identity/expression along with sexual orientation. I believe this was the last straw for the transgender community. The silver lining of this betrayal by the most prominent gav elected official in the nation who operated out of Beacon Hill was that it sparked an anger that turned into the flame of a Transgender Rights Movement in his home state of Massachusetts and beyond.

On October 1, 2007, I received an email from Dru Levasseur, a trans man and attorney, inviting me to the first organizing meeting for New England Transgender Pride (NETP) to be held in Northampton in June 2008. Dru was a friend of mine who had heard me speak at several TDORs and who understood the need for Trans Pride. The community will forever be grateful to him for taking the initial steps to make the first Trans Pride a reality in our region

In December 2007, I wrote an essay, "It's Time for Trans Pride," in which I said that I had been calling for a new Trans Pride Movement at the past three years of TDORs. The essay was published in The Rainbow Times on March 5, 2008 and you can read it online at a link on the Media page of the NETP site www.transpridemarch.org.

The NETP steering committee in 2008 included Dru Levasseur, Danica Marie Ali, Justin Adkins, Alicia, Jackie, and myself with lots of help from Louis Mitchell, Yohah Ralph, Christa Hilfers, Krysia Villon, Robyn and several others-all of whom deserve recognition for our hard work and dedication in making last year's march and rally on June 7, 2008 a wonderful success. My contribution was to handle media relations and communications and to get speakers and entertainers for the rally. In my view, we were all founders

of the first Trans Pride in New England

A few months after the first Trans Pride, Dru Levasseur moved to New York City Then in late 2008 and early 2009, one member of the first Trans Pride steering committee, Justin Adkins, committed to making a second New England Trans Pride happen in August in Montpelier, VT. However, that effort was abandoned and a public announcement was made on March 24, 2009 that there would be no New England Trans Pride this year. The statement was published online at www.transpridemarch.org and in Bay Windows (April 1, 2009) and in The Rainbow Times (April 2, 2009).

Meanwhile, since early 2009, another member of the first Trans Pride steering committee, Christa Hilfers, dreamt of a Trans Pride march and rally that could happen again in Northampton this year. For weeks, I listened to her determination that we would have a second march even if she had to organize it single-handedly.

I had been hospitalized for a week in December 2008. Throughout the early months of 2009 I suffered from, and underwent treatment for, a life-threatening autoimmune disease. As much as I hoped for a second New England Trans Pride, I was too ill to be involved with either effort.

Then, in May 2009, I spent some time talking with Hilfers at Northampton Pride. We agreed that it just was not all right if Trans Pride didn't happen again this year. The sad reality is that the goals we marched for last year - passage of MA H.B.1728 and CT H.B. 6452 and a trans-inclusive ENDA - have still not been met. Our opponents deride our push for civil rights as they fan ignorant fears by calling H.B.1728, "The Bathroom Bill."

I sent Christa the names of two trans women who might be interested in helping her produce a Trans Pride this year in either Northampton or Springfield, MA. My medical treatment continued to progress and I slowly regained some of my health and energy. I decided to commit to helping Christa too, as she had become my friend and I was deeply impressed by her will to continue Trans Pride in our area.

On May 11, 2009, Christa called for the first steering committee meeting, which took place on May 18 with five people in attendance: Christa Hilfers, Brianna Harris, Jane Hamel, Yohah Ralph, and myself. We quickly finalized the name New England Trans United





Annual AIDS Walk RI to raise awareness among youth

Raising awareness-particularly among youth-is a major goal of this year's 22nd annual AIDS Walk RI hosted by AIDS Project RI, a division of Family Service of RI. The event, which will be held on Sunday, October 25, 9 a.m., will take place rain or shine at

Roger Williams National Memorial, 282
North Main Street, downtown Providence.

"We think it's very important to put the walk in an area where there are a lot of people and a lot of college students," says Stephen Hug, senior vice president of development and communications for Family Service of RI. Most recently, the walk had been held at Providence's Roger Williams Park.


This newer and higher profile location will hopefully draw more students, he says, adding that anyone can participate even if they don't raise money. Participants can walk the 5-kilometer course individually or as part of a team.

"Everyone talks about the fact that younger people aren't getting the message because there have been advances in the care. But it's still a terminal disease. We want to make sure that younger people participate," he adds.

The AIDS Walk RI isn't just about finding a cure-it's also about prevention, says Hug. "It's one thing to provide care to those with HIV and AIDS. The other side is about preventing it from happening altogether. That's done through personal choices and education," he says.

Performing aggressive outreach to schools and universities is part of this process, says Hug. As part of this outreach, AIDS Project RI has contacted several local colleges, including Providence College, Johnson & Wales University, and Bryant University, says Hug. Other schools and universities have contacted AIDS Project RI on their own for more information, he says.

The goal is to include 1,000 walkers this year, which would be a significant improvement from last year, says Hug. Political IQ: The national pratfall March on Washington may do more harm than good

n LGBT march on Washington should be a great idea. It should energize the pro-equality community and rally the nation. It should move the president and push Congress into repealing all those laws that punish us for the "crimes" of living and loving while queer.

The Oct. 11 National Equality March, spearheaded by longtime activist Cleve Jones. should do all those things, but I fear it won't. Even worse, the event could damage the movement at a pivotal time.

That's because the march has a fatal flaw: It asks LGBT Americans and allies to waste time, money and energy traveling to Washington, D.C., when we need to stay home and organize in our own backyards.

This flaw is born from a fundamental misunderstanding of how change comes to the Capitol. D.C.-based lobbying is important, but true change only arrives via events that happen far outside the Beltway.

Here's the hard truth: No one wins a vote in the House of Representatives or the Senate until they've changed attitudes in places that are dozens, hundreds and thousands of miles from Capitol Hill. All the visits to Congress and all the rallies on the National Mall aren't half as important as what happens in Des Moines, Fresno, Baltimore, Dallas, Boston and hundreds of other places in the country.

Take the case of Democrat Nancy Pelosi. Why do you suppose the Speaker of the

House is pro-LGBT? Is it because she is a saint who supports our cause even when her constituents don't? Not exactly.

Since 1987 Pelosi has represented the 8th District of California, which encompasses the Castro. Not only does her district include the highest number of same-sex couples in the nation, but it has also been the site of the most sustained LGBT organizing effort in history.

Beginning in the 1960s, continuing with Harvey Milk's campaigns, moving through AIDS activism and up to today, the 8th provides a model of how LGBT people can organize locally. These days an anti-LGBT politician could neither get elected nor stay in office in the California 8th.

Here's a political pop quiz.

Question: When will the Defense of Marriage Act, the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" ban on lesbians and gays in the military and other discriminatory laws be repealed?

Answer: When 219 members of the House and 60 senators realize that their constituents no longer support politicians who work against equality. Those numbers are the votes needed to pass legislation and send it to President Barack Obama for his signature.

Although march leaders say they intend to organize all 435 Congressional districts, pulling people out of their hometowns and sending them on a costly trip won't do that. If only 5,000 people attend the march and each one spends a mere \$500 on travel expenses, this one event will burn through \$2.5 million

that could have been put into local organizing.

The cost is worrisome in the midst of a record-breaking recession. An upcoming vote on marriage equality in Maine and another possible vote in California also need all the financial support we can provide.

March organizers aren't villains, and they're not fools. I've long admired politico David Mixner, who first raised the possibility of a march: organizer Torie Osborn, former executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force; and Cleve Jones.

The California 8th wouldn't be what it is today without Jones. He also helped transform attitudes about AIDS and gave people a way to cope with the epidemic's emotional devastation by founding The NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt.

On this project, though, I respectfully disagree with my three heroes.

Mixner blogged that "having matured into a full-fledged civil rights movement, it is essential that our community move outside its own comfort zone." If I'm reading him correctly. he's talking about the march and bringing straight friends and allies with us to D.C.

Once again, I respectfully disagree. I don't think that Diane Silver joining a anonymous crowd in a gav-friendly city like Washington, D.C., takes much courage, even if we drag our straight family

and friends along.

For LGBT people and our allies in Missouri, Maine and other states that control key votes in Congress, moving outside our comfort zones means demonstrating in our own backyards. These often-conservative places are where our voices - and the voices of our straight family and friends - must be

An LGBT march on Washington should be a great idea. Sometime in the future it might be. Just not today.

school is a waste of resources, and is almost taking a giant step back in advancing LGBT equality in schools."

Nevertheless, according to a 2007 groundbreaking research conducted by the Gay. Lesbian and Straight Education Network, GLSEN, there are factors that influence the safety of LGBT students in America. GLSEN's National School Climate Survey. included a total of 6,209 LGBT K-12 students, from all 50 states and the District of Columbia, between the ages of 13 and 21. The study established four major findings that affect LGBT youth in schools. First, schools in rural communities were the more unsafe than schools in urban or suburban areas. Second, LGBT vouth in higher poverty communities reported more victimization in school because of sexual orientation and gender expression than those in more affluent communities. Third, regional differences in tolerance and acceptance levels appear to be related to other community-level factors. such as educational attainment and income. Lastly, LGBT youth in communities with a higher proportion of college graduates were less likely to hear homophobic remarks or experience victimization based on sexual orientation.

"[The] GLBTQ Online High School will provide a safe place for GLBTQ students to get a high quality, college-preparatory education," said Glick. "In addition to eliminating the negatives of possible harassment and abuse that is all too common in our schools, we will also provide support services and opportunities for positive socializing, in addition to our instructional program."

The Online HS website emphasizes the uniqueness of the school. A component of such distinctiveness, it states, is the GLBTQ-friendly curriculum and how it acknowledges the contributions of GLBTQ individuals in all fields of study. The school provides support services and connects students and families to additional community resources to serve a wide range of social, medical and legal needs. Furthermore, the school's website also stated that besides courses, it provides various other means to interact for many other purposes such as numerous clubs and interest groups in which

all full-time and part-time students can participate depending on the students' interests.

A Northampton first-grade educator, Andrea Egitto, first hesitated about the idea of an online High School because of the openness that the surrounding area already provides GLBTQ community members and students.

"I live in an open and welcoming community with many families having LGBTQ members, be it the parents or children," said Egitto. "I think as a teen it would be easier to go to school here because they would have many peers who either are members of the LGBTQ community or have someone in their family who is."

The idea, Egitto further explained, could work for certain students depending on the available resources and attributes of the community they live in.

"As an educator, I have concerns about the overuse of technology, but I do think this could be a good alternative for LGBTQ students who live in areas that are not as open and affirming as our area," said Egitto. "Being LGBTQ can be incredibly isolating if you don't know anyone else who is out, or who would accept you for who you are ... For students living in those areas, having a connection to a school with other LGBTQ people would be a life saver."

However, Morse still feels that the setting is not a healthy one.

"I worry that these students will have limited social interaction with other students, a critical component of high school and social development," said Morse, a 2008 Point Scholar recipient. "We must work towards empowering LGBT students to speak up and lead efforts to make changes in their community, and I can't see how this online high school will do this."

According to GLSEN's website the Key Findings of the 2007 National School Climate Survey indicate that 86.2 percent of LGBT students reported being verbally harassed, 44.1 percent reported being physically harassed and 22.1 percent reported being physically assaulted at school in the past year because of their sexual orientation. The Survey reported that the grade point average of students who were more frequently harassed because of their sexual

orientation or gender expression was almost half a grade lower than for students who were less often harassed (2.8 versus 2.4).

McNaught, an educator on GLBT issues for 35 years, has been a strong supporter of the GLBTQ Online High School due to the psychological and external consequences that ostracizing, taunting and bullying can have on the young members of the GLBTQ community.

"I do so because I know from personal experience and from the hundreds of calls, letters, and e-mail messages I've received over the years the impact of psychological homelessness on gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender youth." said McNaught. "The new online high school provides them the opportunity for safety and support as they secure their high school degree and prepare themselves for college and/or the work world. Every person who has ever felt frightened, lonely, and depressed in high school because they were different should make a personal commitment and contribution to this noble effort."

The Online GLBTQ High School's tuition is \$5,900. The school hires only highly qualified teachers who genuinely want to work with GLBTQ students. Scholarships and other types of assistance are also available to students and their parents and will assist the school by keeping the costs low.

"We hope to be able to offer multiple scholarship opportunities. We will also work with families to create payment plans that work within their budgets as much as possible," explained Glick. "In some cases, we expect be able to partner with a student's local school district so that the school can pay the tuition for the student. We are currently working on establishing this type of partnership with several large school districts nationwide."

Scholarships are available for students. In addition, donations from community members will help support the curriculum costs and will assist students and parents with the costs.

"We are relying on the LGBT community to provide donations for scholarships for students who otherwise would not be able to afford this school. We are a private, non-profit school that relies on donations and tuition dollars" said Glick. "We appreciate all donations of any size. Northampton: Incumbent (Lesbian) Mayor v. Challenger (Gay Man)

I have lived in or around Northampton most of the last 28 years, and I have known both Mayor Clare Higgins and Councilman Michael Bardsley as acquaintances during much of that time. It occurred to me that readers of TRT may be interested in the November 2009 election for Northampton mayor because it is the first time an out gay man has run against an out lesbian for this office here.

The local and regional media are covering this race with great interest because of what appear to be discrepancies of accountability from our sitting mayor (Higgins) and the possibility that a new mayor (Bardsley) is due simply because Higgins has been mayor for nearly 10 years, and it is "time for change."

When I think about some of the people who have challenged Mayor Higgins in previous elections, "change" would not have been a good thing for us; however, Bardsley is a credible challenger, and this election promises to be close. I confess to admiring each of them for the good and difficult work they have performed. Both Bardsley and Higgins are intelligent, passionate, and dedicated public servants.

To be fair, I asked each candidate the same questions during the interviews. Below you will see their answers (MB and CH).

Please describe your abilities to serve as mayor of Northampton.

MB: First and foremost, my ability to listen is important. I have a 33 year career as a guidance counselor, and I have been very successful in it. I know how to be a public servant and how to address individual needs. I can communicate and set priorities well. Group decision making is important to me and I know how to run a meeting.

CH: January 2010 marks my 10th year as Mayor of Northampton. In that role, I have a grasp of the financial issues—the choices, budget structures, and stresses involved. I have re-structured capital improvements by re-financing so we have more money for projects. Next, I know how to put together teams. Public safety is a good example. The fire department now handles all 911 ambulance calls. On my initiative, there is more accountability for audits and reviews.

Forty percent of all land owned by the City has been preserved under my leadership. On a state level, I have worked to procure grants for this. Affordable housing is a passion of mine. I continue to work tirelessly, as home ownership is too out of reach for many.

Citizens can trust in my lead. Besides being the mayor for nearly 10 years, I served as the first female president of the Massachusetts Mayors sachusetts

Association. I have served on the Massachusetts Budget and Policy Committee. If your opponent wins, do you think s/he will serve the position well?

MB: I think she will serve as she has been serving. Her style and apparent priorities are less than successful. She started off as being very good for the City.

CH: This is a judgment for the voters.

I am writing this for The Rainbow Times. Ten or twenty years ago, it seems there would be emphasis on a gay man and a lesbian competing for the same office. I have noticed that the local/regional media makes no mention of this. How does this make you feel? Is your sexual orientation relevant to the job?

MB: No, my sexual orientation is not relevant to the job. For myself, my working/lower middle class roots in the early 1960's helped me to develop a set of traits and outlooks that have helped me. I can understand others' points of views without judgment.

CH: My sexual orientation informs me, given my age and how things were a number of years ago. Both of us [Higgins and Bardsley] bring this understanding and extra sensitivity. As a practical matter today, my sexual orientation is irrelevant to the job.

I have lived in the area most of my adult life, so I seem to remember that you two have been allies in the past. You respected each other professionally. Can you describe the development of your working relationship and how it led to where you are today? MB: My decision to run isn't a personal decision. It is not because I am against the mayor. There are various differences with the City Council and the Mayor. City government is

not listening to or representing the concerns of a number of citizens. This came most notably to me regarding the Smith College overlay district issues. At a meeting regarding Smith's plans, I made a remark that it was the first time I heard the emphasis on the interests of the "city" rather than of the citizens. This turning point continued, and there were other things brewing behind the scenes that caused me to see thins differently.

CH: Michael is a long-time elected leader in Northampton. He has served ably as a City Councilman. There are not too many issues we disagree on.

Name three qualities you are most proud of in yourself as you have served the public. Can you name three for your opponent?

MB: First, my ability to see things from the other person's point of view. Second, my ability to work with a wide range of people, conservative and liberal. Third, I am thoughtful in that I take issues and work to balance things

The Mayor is experienced, she is intelligent, and she can focus in on and retain policy information well.

CH: First, I have a broad grasp of issues and the experience to work them through. Second, I bring patience to the job. Third, I bring creativity to find ways to accomplish things that have not been done in the past.

It is up to Councilman Bardsley to demonstrate his qualities to the voters.

Enough about your opponent. Is Northampton where you thought it would be 10 years ago? What are the main challenges for maintaining the City and for moving forward?

MB: Ten years ago, I cannot remember. One thing evident then (and stronger now) is that Northampton is becoming more gentrified/upscale. It is such a desirable place to live for people with means. I am concerned the balance will tip and we will lose middle and working families.

CH: I would have liked to be in a better place for funding now. We receive less in state aid than we did eight years ago! It makes it difficult to invest in education; however, our education is in good shape considering this. I would like more investing in our schools. We have had two recessions-first, post 9/11, and then again, the current recession now in its second year.

I am very excited about the state hospital grounds re-development. It is creating iobs. But I am concerned about housing costs in Northampton. I wish it was overall more affordable. It seems to be a market issue. Ten years ago, I did not know we would get the number of state and national recognitions we have received. Northampton is a "good place to live," according to many lists. Behind those lists, artists, business owners and others who have worked hard here have made this happen. Do you think it is important to balance the integrity of downtown with progress?

MB: The City could have played a more influential leadership role to develop the identity of downtown. We can work with businesses.

The (Business Improvement District) should have heen unnecessary. I voted for because shop owners were desperate for relief want to keep downtown clean, keep it safe, and pro-

mote it.

CH: No one is investing in new buildings, so the balance issue is not a struggle. A more interesting thing is holding onto the unique flavor of independent businesses. Can we hold onto locally-owned unique goods and services? The BID is one way. It keeps downtown clean and looking nice. I am thrilled to see what they are doing.

How do new, young business people come in? I liked seeing them at meetings about the RID.

Why do so many people come to Northampton to stay, shop and eat? This was not the case in the 1980's. Who is responsible for the surge in tourism?

MB: Pieces of the community are responsible. The artists, first and foremost, are responsible. I was drawn to Northampton when I first moved here in 1970. Also, the restaurants and shops draw people here.

CH. Real estate values rose. Businesses such as Foster Farrar moved from downtown, and clothing and jewelry retail stores stayed. The higher end stores and the restaurant boom have helped. There are so many great places to eat. Also, the hotel in the center of town and the entertainment venues are appealing.

If the growth in Northampton moved in a direction that made it difficult for LGBT community members to stay here, what would you do as mayor?

MB: Keeping it affordable is a priority, which means addressing it for a cross section of people-the LGBT community, people of all races, and young people. It could become an "exclusive" community if we do not continue to work on affordability.

I would always address civil rights/human rights issues. I have been active in our annual pride march, and I worked to set up the City's human rights commission. I was the first openly gay elected official in Northampton 20 years ago.

CH: The concerns here are primarily economic. Northampton will not turn into a bible belt city. It's not just the LGBT community, but also people of color and of less means. This has been a 25-30 year trend here. Downtown used to comprise of mixed income residents. Because of the reputation here, there are also lots of LGBT families with money moving

Schoefield's Becoming a Man in 127 Easy Steps: Truly brilliant!

For the first time in US history, gender is being discussed at the dining room table, at the water cooler, and even on the Senate floor. Now that the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) includes gender identity and expression, gender non-conforming Americans may become first class citizens. At least that's the hope of award-winning theater artist Scott Turner Schofield whose new solo play, Becoming a Man in 127 EASY Steps, reminds us that this conversation is about people, and every person has stories about their journey to become the person they are today.

Irreverent and dynamic, graceful and playful, Becoming a Mam.. engages the deep questions and the locker room jokes about what it means to become a man. This show invites the audience to come along on a surprising journey of finding oneself. The Rainbow Times sent part of its staff to attend the show. The following Q&A emerged from questions that arose after attending Scott's brilliant performance.

How did you get started performing the 127 ways ... and how has the community received it?

The show was commissioned by three companies in the U.S. through the National Performance Network. I expressed to The Pat Graney Company in Seattle, DiverseWorks in Houston, and 7 Stages in Atlanta that I wanted to write a final piece of my artistic trilogy about my gender identity (Underground Transit and Debutante Balls were my first two), and they generously supported me in creating the work.

Every audience I've encountered has praised the work for its universality and comedy, its perspective on gender, and its artistic voice and ingenuity. I couldn't be more honored by such feedback. I guess the biggest honor to me as an artist is that my little show about my weird life could reach so many different kinds of people. That's exactly what I've always wanted to do.

Some people would say that it take a lot of guts to do a full frontal as part of the show. How do you feel in that exact moment?

[Laughs] To be honest, I go to this place inside myself that makes me feel completely strong and in control. I feel very powerful when I'm totally naked. After all, for once, the transperson gets to be in charge of the conversation about what surgeries are available or possible, so in this instance, I am the powerful one for sure.

What is the purpose of "127?"

Great question! My purpose in creating "Becoming a Man in 127 EASY Steps" was to reach out as far as I possibly could-to as many different kinds of people-with stories that are personally powerful and artistically moving.

What long term expectations do you have pertaining to your performance career?

Oh, I wish I could have expectations! How about deeply-held dreams? Yes. I hope to become a positive image for mainstream culture's perception of what it can mean to be a transgender person. That is, I hope that my work will earn me good success as an artist that will make people think twice before imagining anything negative about transfolks. I hope to be able to write a lot of different plays and movies—related to gender and not—that will push those art forms to great heights. I hope to become known as a TV and film actor, playing trans and non-trans roles. Not that I'm already practicing my Oscar speech, or anything ...

here. They want good schools for their children

So, this is a class issue. Can we make sure there's a range of options? When Smith College expanded, we made sure to make affordable housing there. It must remain so for at least 99 years. Meadowbrook has 200+homes that are preserved as affordable housing

Hampshire County was ranked #2 in the country for percentage of same-gender households in the 2000 census. Why then, did the Chamber of Commerce drag its heels about promoting Northampton as a destination for same-sex couples when the marriage laws changed in 2004? Why, today, is their language so mainstream in promoting LGBT tourism? Are they catering to homophobic forces?

MB: The Chamber has a cautious approach. Several strengths of Northampton could be used more effectively-including its diversity. It would attract people. The Chamber has done a poor job in promoting Northampton at all.

CH: I have not looked at this and have not found the Chamber to be homophobic. LGBT business people should get involved. We have a very active Chamber, and they are looking at re-organizing in lots of different ways.

How does who you are in your sexual orientation add to your character and abilities?

MB: I know how to persevere and I have the ability to have a long view through difficult times. For example, in running for mayor [against the incumbent], initially, I got both flak and support. Rather than be discouraged, I told myself that I have gone through worse than this. I am not afraid to stand up for my rights and the rights of others! When a Councilman recused himself from a controversy, as Council at Large, I stepped up to represent his ward.

CH: I have an understanding about being an outsider, and I am sensitive about being discriminated against. Mostly, I know how to use power tools.

Do you have a Plan B if you do not get elected?

MR: I will have a life

CH: I will take time off and think about what's next. It would be something that makes positive change.

I admire how each of you has largely dedicated your life to public service of one kind or another. How would I know how to vote in November? Convince me. I may reveal to readers in a later column my personal process in deciding.

MB: Each person has to look at the City. From my point of view, the status quo is not working as well as it could. As an educator, I have given out many grades. I give Northampton a C- now. Considerations in this grade include: the decision-making process of government, concerns for the working and middle class, leadership on the environment, and support of elementary schools.

CH: I have a record of service in this particular job. I have experience in things such as working to bring change in housing, financial management, supporting the schools. There will be a rough two years ahead. People can trust that I can carry us through and manage in difficult times.

Is there anything else you would like to share with our readers?

MB: This is a difficult challenge for the LGBT community. People are torn, and I have been accused of fanning the flames of division in the community for political purposes. My response is that this is not for personal gain. I am not a politician, but rather a public servant. What does Northampton need? Who can provide it? The status quo has got to go. CH: There has been a fair amount of discussion about transparency. I kicked off a "sustainable" group with many people involved to work hard to get information to our citizens. I use a web site to post the budget. We are online with city ordinances and minutes from meetings. I hope to continue to do more for an open government.

satisfaction, maybe even a status thing so they can think they're cool. But for me being with women is a serious thing. Personally I don't think that there are really bisexuals. They are people who just are afraid of truly being themselves or playing some game. I have been really hurt in the past and I'm afraid of being hurt again. I wonder what you think about bisexuality. Do you think it is real? Do you think I should stay in this relationship or get out while I can? Please help! Frightened and confused, Chervl

Dear Cheryl:

I understand your concern. Having two lovers back with men can be very disturbing and confusing. I don't know that I can fully answer your questions since I do not know the people involved or much about you, but I can give some things to consider.

The Kinsey Reports, researched then written in 1948 and 1953 at a time when attitudes about sex and sexual orientation were much more closeted, showed that adults show an extremely high rate of sexual "reaction" to both the same and opposite sex. Dr. Kinsey and his colleagues determined that at least 50% of people had sexual feelings towards both genders. This information has not been refuted since that time.

Cheryl, this means that bisexuality is real. Also, from my own life experience of being part of the LGBTQ community since the '70's, I have seen "heterosexual" people of many different age groups come out as well as gay and lesbian people reengage in heterosexuality.

I do believe that there are lesbian and gay people too afraid to confront homophobia and never manage that transition. Additionally, as it is argued, there is probably some truth that some people choose "heterosexual privilege," who otherwise may be gay or lesbian. But the biggest thing I've learned both as a human being and as a therapist is that the world and it's possibilities are huge. There is such a wide spectrum of interests, attitudes and beliefs. So

much of life is not black or white, one clear way or the other. Diversity, so often talked about is real. Also, we human being are not static. We change and do so constantly. Likes, dislikes, needs, wishes and so much more change through the course of our lifetimes, sometimes again and again.

So you see Cheryl, it is impossible to say what the truth is for your past girlfriends and your current on.

With that said, let me suggest that you get to know your girlfriend well before going deeper with her. This, by the way is always a good thing, regardless of any questions of sexual orientation. Find out how well she knows herself. Is she generally consistent? In other words are her words and actions the same? How much integrity does she have? Is she a good friend, does she show an ability to commit to people and things? If these kinds of things check out and she is clear about her love and commitment to you, her bisexuality may not be a threat to you. Some bisexual people do commit to long term gay and lesbian relationships. It depends on the person. Talk openly and honestly with her and see if she has the kind of substance you're looking for in a partner.

The Outfield: 'Stronghold' stands up for wrestling four years, Rook



By: Dan Woog* restlers get erections.

That straightforward fact is the elephant in the wrestling room. And it's just one of many controversial, often-ignored top-

ics addressed by Victor Rook in his insightful new documentary, "Stronghold: In the Grip of Wrestling."

Here are others: Vast numbers of men are sexually attracted to wrestling. As kids, they cut photos out of library wrestling books; as adults, they believe they must hide their interest.

Now-thanks to Rook's film, an accompanying book and his WrestleMen.com Web sitewrestling fans are coming out of the closet.

Growing up near Buffalo, Rook did not wrestle. "I thought you had to be a short, thicknecked Italian," he laughs. "I was tall and lanky. I played tennis."

He earned a degree in mechanical engineering from Michigan State, then worked as a technical writer for years. But in the late 1990s he realized two ambitions: He made a nature documentary for PBS, and he started wrestling.

After a wrestling cartoon he drew earned attention, he guit his job, Since 1998 WrestleMen.com has been his main source of

income. Through conversations with thousands of men - gay and straight, single and married he realized his attraction to wrestling was far

In 2004, he decided to make a film. He wanted to address sensitive subjects like wrestling homoeroticism, but in a way that straight and gay men could both respect. He also wanted to include every form of wrestling: amateur, professional, submission and "horseplay,"

He posted a request for interviews on the Web site of USA Wrestling, the umbrella organization for high school and college grappling. It was removed on the grounds of "solicitation." However, a similar request for a fictional film was allowed to remain

Rook says that USAW did not want to be associated with lightning-rod issues. He notes, That's unfortunate. Those same issues - boys' shame about their bodies, and homophobia ultimately prevent more kids from getting into wrestling.

As he traveled the country filming interviews, Rook felt pressure from two sides. "Gays were afraid that this film may set back gay men who take wrestling seriously," he says. "And straight audiences wanted nothing to do with anything that spoke of homoeroticism, even when kids make constant jokes about wrestling looking so

But clearly, interest was there. Every day for

a man who was a woman, a lesbian turned straight guy who is often mistaken for a gay man, and he has entertained feminists and fratboys, season subscribers and people who "don't like theater," in big cities and small towns across the U.S. and Europe. Scott Turner Schofield teaches us that gender is a story full of gorgeous imagery, mind-blowing physicality, hilarity and poignancy, and that stories must work in conjunction with legislation to bring about real change and sincere inclusion in our cul-

wore a wrestling T-shirt. That made people feel comfortable initiating conversations. "In bars. guvs have their dumped girlfriends to talk to me all night about wrestling." Rook says.

Compared with the rest of filmmaking, the inter-

views were easy; finding archival footage was especially arduous. Rook spent months searching for clips in the public domain, and obtaining rights for others. But the many black-and-white and sepia pictures of boys and men wrestling through the ages provide graphic evidence that such activity has long been part of male life.

Rook spent enormous time organizing his material. "Before you can talk about one thing, vou have to cover another," he notes. For example, a section on "Masculinity and Wrestling" served as a lead-in to more sensitive discussions of arousal and eroticism later on.

Current events played a role too. When eBay banished all amateur-made wrestling videos to the "Mature Audiences" section - even those with no sexual content - Rook juxtaposed the decision with female and coed videos, which were not affected.

Cramming all that - while describing the stark distinction between scholastic and professional wrestling, the societal taboo against adult amateur wrestling and the underground world of wrestling for pleasure and gratification - into two hours was extremely difficult. Rook ended up including an hour of material on an "extras" disc.

Reaction has been very positive. Men tell Rook they no longer feel alone or odd because of their attraction to wrestling.

The film has been praised by coaches, too. Among the most compelling interviewees is a high school coach who seems surprised when he realizes he never addresses fears of erections, or the perception that all wrestlers are gay, with his young charges.

Rook hopes the video is seen by many scholastic coaches. "Listening to adult men talk about their fears and shame around wrestling growing up may help coaches become more sensitive to their wrestlers' concerns," he says.

Until then, Rook will be sustained by a conversation he had with a teenager. Advising him to ignore the gibes of those who call wrestling a "gay sport" - and to concentrate on the self-confidence, physical fitness and joy he takes from training and competition - Rook told the boy: "Don't worry. It's not about you. It's about everyone else, and what they're feeling."
